# CATCHING UP WITH PRINCIPAL, MS MARYNA MARAIS

**BEFORE SHE RETIRES...** 

ourty four years of dedicated service in Education! This is indeed an achievement that needs to be celebrated! Let's go for a quick stroll down memory lane to recap this extraordinary journey:

Ms Marais started her career as a teacher for grades 10 – 12 Accounting and Business Economics at Hoërskool Hartbeespoort in January 1974.

She got married at the end of 1974 and then taught at Carletonville Hoërskool and Hoërskool Jan Viljoen in Randfontein where she was the Head of Department of Commercial Subjects.

Her husband, who was also a teacher at that time, then got promoted as Principal of Hoërskool Wesvalia in Klerksdorp in 1992. The only teaching post that Ms Marais could get in Klerksdorp was at the then Klerksdorp Technical College where she started as a lecturer from October 1992 - December 1995.

Ms Marais describes the move from the schooling system to the

Technical College system as a new, exciting and sometimes scary experience as she knew very little about Technical Colleges! She was an examiner and moderator for Economics Higher and Standard Grades and used to write articles on examination tips in the Beeld and Readers Digest but now had to start all over as a PL 1 lecturer offering Office Practice to N4 – N6 students in an environment which was totally different from being a teacher at a school.

She was then appointed as the Head of Administration (Registrar) at Klerksdorp College in January 1996 and from January 2001 – March 2003 Ms Marais was the Vice-Rector at Klerksdorp Technical College. Ms Marais says that her experience as a teacher,

### Describe your tenure as Principal of ORBIT College in iust three words?

### Share with us some of the highlights of your career?

Being able to provide a vision, set direction and inspirepeople to believe in the ORBIT Dream, despite all the challenges experienced after the merger of Technical Colleges.

Being awarded the Golden Award for Leadership in the North West Province during the Public Service Excellence Awards of the Premier of the North West Province.

Since 2003 the infrastructure of ORBIT College has been improved to ensure a conducive teaching and learning environment. The following new infrastructure has been established since 2003: 10 Engineering workshops that are fully equipped with the latest equipment (aligned to Industry standards), all Campuses have fully functional and equipped Student Support Centres, all lecturing class rooms and workshops have full connectivity and each class room has a computer for the use of the lecturer, a Central Office, a state-of-the-art Hospitality Training Centre for workplace simulation, a multi-purpose hall at Brits Campus, additional class rooms at all 3 campuses, etc. In general, the facilities of all ORBIT College sites are of a high standard which contributes to a positive teaching and learning environment and reflects a corporate image that is attractive to both staff and students.

Being able to learn more about the sector and to share my knowledge and experience at various platforms such as being a member of the National Executive Committee of the South African Principals' Organisation since 2004, member of Ministerial Task Teams such as the Ministerial Committee on Articulation Policy, Task Teams appointed by the DG of DHET such as National Implementation Task Team (NITT) that provided oversight over the transfer of colleges to the DHET, Task Team for TVET College Bursary Scheme, Task Team member for the development of Post Provisioning Norms and Standards for TVET College staff and Trainer and Head of Cluster for the DHET Campus Manager Training.

### What can you say about the stature of TVET Colleges in the country?

Since the inception of the new Ministry in 2009, TVET Colleges have been seen differently by various stakeholders. The College Sector is central to the provision of post-school education and training, and is the area targeted by the DHET for the greatest expansion and diversification. The sector still has a long way to go to address all challenges but the future of TVET Colleges is bright with so many possibilities to make an impact on the socio-economic spheres of

### Are you satisfied with the role Colleges are playing in addressing the skills shortage and unemployment in the country?

Although there are achievements in this regard, much more can be done. The challenge is that all programmes are not 100% aligned to Industry needs. However, the DHET is addressing this challenge by establishing Centres of Specialisation which will focus on the new QCTO Occupational Qualifications in close collaboration with employers.

### What role would you say your Senior Management team and staff have played in helping you with your achievements with the College?

I would not have been able to achieve what we have achieved without my Deputies, the Management Board and the rest of the staff. As they say, Teamwork makes the Dream work!

### **Excellence in TVET College Sector celebrated at TVET Imibizo** n addressing pressing issues

within the Technical and Vocational Education and Training (TVET) Sector, the Department of Higher Education and Training (DHET) hosted an Imbizo from 3 - 5 October 2017 in Benoni, Johannesburg.

TVET College Principals as well as various stakeholders including former Minister of Higher Education and Training, Dr Blade Nzimande, NEHAWU and other prominent individuals in Higher Education were invited to the three-

day conference, pursuant of solutions to some of the biggest challenges facing TVET Colleges. The purpose of the Imbizo according to the DHET was "to identify the challenges in the TVET system, and to analyse the underlying causes of systemic problems and collectively formulate mechanisms to resolve these challenges". Under the TVET Sector 2017 theme 'Defining a shared vision, removing obstacles and

charting a roadmap to our destination', some of the key issues addressed during the Imbizo amongst others were: governance and management issues, lack of funding as well as the responsive and relevance of the TVET College curriculum.

The conference was concluded on a high note, as the former Minister, Dr Nzimande recognised and celebrated excelling Colleges and stakeholders during the 'TVET Colleges Excellence Award Ceremony' which took place on day one of the Imbizo. 

# **MUNICIPALITY (RLM) SIGNS MOU WITH ORBIT COLLEGE**

he RLM has signed a ground breaking Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) and a Service Level Agreement with ORBIT TVET College in what we would like to refer to as an "unavoidable partnership"

The main purpose of the MoU is:

to form a basis upon which the College will be able to provide RLM employees with further education & training in line with their developmental mandate guided by the Skills Development Act and related legislation and to forge a working relationship with ORBIT TVET College for the purpose of providing job specific courses and training depending on the need. The Service Level Agreement, signed on 13 October 2017 forms the basis on which training programmes at ORBIT TVET College will be offered to RLM employees.

Training commenced on 04 November 2017. Courses such as Municipal Finance, Project Management, SHE REP, Customer Care Conflict Management. Basic Electricity, Bricklaying, Office Administration, Basic Plumbing etc. were offered to employees of the Municipality.

This relationship with the Municipality has also benefitted the College in many ways and we are hopeful that for the next three years we will be able to extend these benefits to many other activities.

Students and lecturers from the College have been placed at the Municipality to gain work experience.

The Municipality has offered support to the College to establish an Agricultural Academy in Rustenburg. We hope that this project can commence in 2018/19.

The Municipality has offered the College access to its buildings at the Rustenburg Showground to be used for examination purposes and for training of unemployed youth in the community.

We are excited about the prospects of this MoU, which is still in its infancy, but has already proved to be a mutually beneficial relationship that will benefit our local community in terms of job creation & skills


