INTEL LAUNCHES FIRST EVER ARTIFICIAL INTELLIGENCE LAB IN AFRICA AT ORBIT COLLEGE, BRITS CAMPUS

ORBIT TVET College has become the first institution in Africa to roll out Intel's Artificial Intelligence (AI) Future Workforce Programme. The launch, which took place on 20 July 2022, was a collaborative effort between Intel, the Department of Higher Education & Training (DHET) and the College. It also saw the opening of a new AI laboratory at Brits Campus.

The aim of the programme is to inspire young students to explore opportunities in artificial intelligence and spark interest in developing solutions, once they get the knowhow. Participants will gain practical skills in programming and coding, algorithm and computational thinking, social skills, AI ethics, critical thinking and problem-solving skills, systems mapping and solution building. Upon successful completion of the course, students will receive certificates of competency.

The College was honoured to have at the event, Intel Vice President Sales and Marketing and General Manager EMEA Territory, Mr Maurits Tichelman who shared that through the programme, South Africa can start training the next generation of future technologists and innovators, who will contribute to the President Cyril Ramaphosa's Fourth Industrial Revolution (4IR) mandate. "Al is one of the technology superpowers driving growth, innovation, and job creation in every aspect of society. It is therefore an honour for Intel to be able to contribute to the development of artificial intelligence skills at ORBIT College," Mr Tichelman said. He added that this programme is the first of its kind to be launched in South Africa and on the African continent, with ORBIT College serving as a "beacon" for the country's TVET institutions.

So far, Intel officials and facilitators from different parts of the world, have trained twelve Master Coaches at the College. These coaches were awarded certificates at the event; and of the twelve, two have already been poached by industry.

A delighted Dr Nick Balkrishen, Regional Manager for North West and Mpumalanga TVET and CET Colleges explained that the programme is an appetiser AI course which provides a broad overview of what AI is. "There are other steps of the training programme and we feel this will empower the students greatly. If they have an interest in AI, then they will take all the steps in the training programme that are being offered to grow their interests. As a region, we want to extend this programme to the six TVET colleges in the region. It's starting out at ORBIT, but we want to extend it to the other five Colleges, as we want all of our colleges and students to benefit." Dr Balkrishen added.

An equally excited Mr Dika Mokoena, Principal of ORBIT College, indicated that this AI skills initiative marks the shift toward project-based education, and that the College will ensure that students are well equipped with technical and technological facilities so that they can improve their skills and knowledge. Mr Mokoena shared the sentiments of the DHET Director General, Dr Nkosinathi Sishi, who said that the emphasis of the department is on high-priority skills areas. "Critical skills and skills in high-demand are important to us, so the laboratory will definitely bring skills that will make young South Africans excel worldwide. "We urge students to take part in the project, as they would benefit and gain skills that would help them compete in the world of technology and innovation," Dr Sishi concluded.

One of the highlights of the event was when Brits Campus student, Mr Neo Matjeke who is one of the students who has completed the appetiser course, took to the stage to outline how he would design a smart traffic system to prevent pedestrian injuries. Through the use of Al, traffic lights would notify pedestrians

about a car that may not be able to stop in time, enabling smarter decisions, and saving lives.

The AI for Future Workforce initiative has already been rolled out in other parts of the world and forms part of the Intel Digital Readiness programmes, but it is the first initiative in Africa at a North West TVET College.

Amongst other guests of honour present on the day were DHET Deputy Director General: TVET Branch, Mr Sam Zungu, DHET and Intel Officials, College Council Chairperson, Dr Kabelo Molantoa and College Senior Management.

POST PROVISION NORMS (PPN) UPDATE

he Department of Higher Education and Training (DHET) initiated a countrywide project for TVET Colleges, aimed at developing and implementing organisational structures to suit the needs of each College. DHET has since developed and approved a Post Provision Norms (PPN) procedure manual intended to guide the implementation of the project, particularly at College level. The implementation of the PPN model and college structure in TVET Colleges is driven by the College PPN Implementation Committees of individual colleges in a phased approach over a three year period, as outlined in the PPN Implementation Management Plan.

The ORBIT CIC had initially opted for the Deputy Principal Registrar-based

organisational structure, but later opted for the Deputy Principal Innovation-based organisational structure as a more suitable structure instead. This change was communicated to both DHET and College staff at large.

The progress the CIC has made thus far includes the identification of employees who were previously on the College Council Payroll and who qualified for migration to PERSAL. We are pleased to announce that the transfer of these employees has now been completed.

Following the process of matching employees to the chosen structure, the CIC conducted roadshows across all sites aimed at informing and updating employees about the process of implementation. Matching and placement letters were issued out to all employees during these roadshows. The following four categories of letters were issued to employees:

Category 1- Employees who were placed on posts that are at the same level as their current substantive posts

Category 2- Employees matched and placed on posts at a higher level than their current post as a result of the job evaluation that the DHET has conducted.

Category 3- Employees who were matched at a lower level than their current post, also as a result of the job evaluation conducted by the DHET.

Category 4- Employees who could not be placed and matched on the chosen PPN Organisational Structure.

The majority of employees across all sites have responded positively to the letters issued to them and have accepted their placement. However, a small number of employees have objected to their placement, and the CIC is in the process of addressing the objections received in order to communicate the feedback to the said employees in due course.

Most importantly, the Committee has also identified critical posts that need to be advertised, to which the necessary permission to do so has been obtained from the DHET.

I wish to extend my appreciation to the CIC for their efforts and hard work, as we are well on course in executing our mandate as outlined by the PPN Implementation Procedure Manual. The doors of the CIC remain open to engage staff on any questions and/or concerns that they may have regarding the process thus far.

AN UNQUALIFIED AUDIT REPORT FROM AGCA IT ICI

n 2014, ORBIT College become one of the first fifteen colleges in the country to be audited by the Auditor-General of South Africa (AGSA). AGSA is the only institution that audits and reports on the public sector expenditure of the South African tax payers' money as expressed in Chapter 9 of the country's Constitution. The decision by DHET to include TVET Colleges in the list of institutions to be audited by the AG come after a few areas of concerns were identified in the TVET College Sector, such as lack of appropriate internal controls and adequate record-keeping, ineffective governance structures and poor risk management. From 2018 to 2020 ORBIT College could not manage to obtain an unqualified report.

However, things changed for the better with the 2021 audit, as ORBIT College received an unqualified audit report from the AGSA. The AGSA audit commenced on 01 April and was concluded on 30 June 2022. This is indeed a milestone and an enormous achievement as the ungualified audit report is testimony of the consistent hard work that was done by the ORBIT College team over the years to improve administrative systems and ensure adherence to legislation across all areas that were audited. Hats off to the ORBIT College team under the competent leadership of Mr Stefan Senekal, Acting Deputy Principal Finance for this outstanding achievement!

The four day event got off to a start with a gala dinner event at Hedgehog's Nest, Rustenburg on day one (18 November 2022) which was attended by, amongst others,

dignitaries from the Department of Higher Education and Training and the North West Regional Office. The actual competition took place over the next two days on 19 & 20 November at the various ORBIT Campuses. The event was concluded with a closing ceremony at Hedgehog's Nest, where all winners who would represent the #TeamNorthWest at the Nationals were announced.

Each College was represented by two candidates per category, and at least one Orbitant in each category managed to seal their spot to advance to the National Competition.

#TeamNorthWest headed for Durban on 06 June 2022 to compete with students from the other TVET Colleges representing the nine provinces. The team managed to walk away with position one in the IT Network Administration, Bricklaying and Mechanical Engineering, and will advance to the World Skills Competition scheduled for Shanghai China in October 2022. They were awarded gold medals.

ORBIT TVET COLLEGE LAUNCHES ONLINE LEARNING

t was the academic vision of the college in 2021 to realise the full implementation of a blended learning approach from 2022, ensuring that we meet the demands of a world responding to the Fourth Industrial Revolution. A big step towards this realisation has taken place. ORBIT College has officially launched a fully online learning programme. From the second Semester of 2022, a group of students will be registered for the Human Resource Management N4 programme as fully online students at the Rustenburg Campus. The college has finally responded to the demands of many students, who wish to study while at home or while at work.

Students who pursue the online learning mode of delivery will need to have access to a laptop/PC and a reliable internet connection and data, as they will need to access most of their study material through our online learning portal (https:// Ims.myorbit.co.za/portal). The students will be attending weekly online classes via the video streaming platform of Microsoft Teams. These live online classes will ensure that students receive opportunities to interact with their lecturers live, to ask questions and provide inputs on how to improve their online learning experience. They will not need to come to the college for contact classes during the semester, and will only need to go to the ORBIT TVET Rustenburg Campus to write their DHET National final examinations.

Studying fully online has been the trend in education for a while now, and the college is excited to have joined this revolution that has taken over teaching and learning around the world. Inasmuch as the COVID19 pandemic has disadvantaged a number of teaching and learning processes within educational institutions, it has also created opportunities for institutions to be innovative and creative. Our innovative and creative response to these changing and challenging times was to adopt this new online learning mode of learning delivery, as a critical step towards the realisation of the current 4IR call to have classrooms and teaching and learning processes digitized and enhanced with technology.

In preparation for offering the fully online programme, the college e-learning portal was prepared and loaded with interactive digital learning content that will be used by lecturers to offer online lessons. The content is designed to promote self-directed learning with lecturers assuming the very important roles of facilitator and mediator of learning, as they teach online. The lecturers who will be offering the fully online programme have undergone additional training, to ensure that they are more than competent and prepared to fulfil their obligation as online lecturers. They have also received training on how to create the interactive digital learning content that has to be loaded onto the portal, to ensure that students are continuously engaged.

Students enrolled for online classes will not be left to fend for themselves when they study remotely as they will also have full access to our student support services via electronic means. Contact details of student support officials and other relevant officials will be provided to students so that they do not feel excluded or isolated from the college environment as they study online.

It goes without saying that globally online studying is the current alternative learning mode that proves to be very popular among working prospective students and those who would otherwise be challenged to attend contact classes. Not only has the college received a high number of applications for the online programme on offer, but students also expressed the wish to have more programmes offered online. In order to realise the college blended learning approach to teaching and learning, additional fully online programmes will be offered from 2023, in attempts to respond to current community demands.

The future appears to require of ORBIT College to grow our online offerings, and without a doubt, we are ready to embrace this demand as an opportunity to enhance the academic principles of accessibility and life-long learning!

COLLEGE EQUIPS LECTURERS WITH ICT SKILLS THROUGH THE DIGITAL TRANSFORMATION OF TVET COLLEGES COURSE

Digital transformation leads to massive changes in the skills set needed for work and life. Successful use of digital technologies is also a key factor in meeting the 2030 Sustainable Development Goals founded by the United Nations. In addition to this, teaching and learning need to address the changes and challenges brought about by the introduction of Information and Communication Technologies (ICT) in almost all areas. To this end, the College, through the HR

The College has enrolled academic staff from all three campuses (Brits, Mankwe and Rustenburg) for the Digital Transformation Implementation course. The on-site training took place in March and July 2022 respectively at the Rustenburg Campus Auditorium.

Unit, has enrolled the college academic staff into the digital transformation implementation course aimed at equipping college lecturers with ICT skills for teaching technologies to adhere to the 4th Industrial Revolution (4IR) requirements in education. interactive Flat-Panel Display. The Flat-Panel Display might look like a large television screen, but it is a digital device that allows users to access their computer files and interact with them in an engaging way while also creating new content.

The course, which is facilitated by Bank SETA and the South African Public Colleges Organisation (SAPCO), entails two days of on-site training and four days of online training (two hours per day). For the duration of the course, lecturers receive training in the following modules namely: classroom technologies, learning management, video management technologies and conferencing technologies. The first on-site training session for the first group of lecturers took place on 30 and 31 March 2022 at the Rustenburg Campus Auditorium, while the second group received their on-site training on 20 & 21 July 2022. As Bill Gates once said: "Teachers need to integrate technology seamlessly into the curriculum instead of viewing it as an add-on, an afterthought, or an event." This is particularly true for TVET Colleges when it comes to preparing students for the present and future world of work. Upon completion of the course lecturers will be awarded accredited certificates.

ORBIT COLLEGE HOSTS FIRST PHYSICAL GRADUATION AFTER TWO YEARS OF VIRTUAL EVENTS

ORBIT TVET College held its first physical graduation ceremony after two years of virtual graduations; which saw approximately 450 graduates with National Certificates and National N Diplomas being conferred. The graduation ceremonies, which were split into three sessions, took place on 12 & 13 May 2022 at Hedgehog's Nest, Rustenburg respectively.

Two years after the Covid-19 pandemic halted their face-to-face celebrations, 313 NCV graduates came out in numbers on Thursday, 12 May 2022 to be awarded for completing their respective Level 4 qualifications; while 119 Diplomandi (Report 191 Business & Engineering Studies) were acknowledged on Friday, 13 May 2022.

Ms KR Masilo from Brits Campus, was awarded the sought-after DUX Student Award for National Certificate (Vocational) studies, for her consistent excellent academic performance in the Office Administration qualification. Ms Masilo obtained an average of 87.86% and also bagged an incredible fifteen distinctions over her three year period of study. Another Brits Campus student, Management Assistant graduate, Ms K Motloung scooped the DUX Student Award for National N Diploma, after she achieved an average of 79.83% and an impressive nine distinctions over her period of study.

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
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

After two years of restrictions, the ORBIT College marketing team is back in action and more determined than ever to engage our community on a larger scale, leaving no stone unturned in reaching out to the publics. Schools are now more welcoming in opening their gates for us to interact with their learners on a more regular basis and face-to-face marketing activities within the communities at large have also gained momentum. So to date, the feedback is really pleasing.

Career exhibitions and information-sharing sessions

The College was well represented at fourteen (14) career expos that were hosted by various schools within our catchment areas since the beginning of the year. At least twenty (20) secondary schools were reached via mini career expos, targeting mainly grade 12 learners as well as out-of-school youths. Schools that we interacted with during mini career expos included Makuka, Tshaile, Modise, Nkobong, Gaopotlake, Mochudi, Mmanape, Kgatsheng-Thabiso, JM Ntsime, Holy Family, Manamakgotha, Ramotshodi, Rethusegile, Makoba, Batleng, Freedom Park, Marikana, Matlhare Mokautu, Sunrise View and Sekete. A number of information-sharing sessions that formed part of

outreach programmes and career days for grade 9 learners were also attended. At least one career day was attended for the grade 9 learners of Matlhare Mokautu Secondary School. More grade 9 career days are expected to be hosted during the months of September & October. The ORBIT College team always support school career days for grade 9 learners as per need, as learners who have passed grade 9 are key potential students for our National Certificate Vocational Programmes.

Community outreach to NEETs market

The College marketing team also attended a career outreach programme for the unemployed and out-of-school youth of the Ledig community during which we interacted with approximately 400 of those not in Employment Education & Training (NEETs). It was quite alarming to see such a large gathering of young people from a single community who are not in education or even involved in any kind of work/training, even though institutions such as ORBIT TVET College are mandated to address these very challenges! The question remains as to why our youth are not interested in taking part in education regardless a number of non-refundable funding options being available from government.

DHET National Career Week Campaign



The College was well represented at the Youth for Rustenburg (Y4R) Skills Development and Career Expo that was organised by Rustenburg Local Municipality. The event was held at Rustenburg Old Town Hall on 24 June 2022. The target market was grade 11 & 12 learners of the following secondary schools: Freedom Park, Marikana, Sunrise View & Sekete.

The National Career Week Campaign which was an initiative of DHET, took place from 03 April to

09 April 2022. The campaign was intended to raise awareness about career development initiatives that were implemented countrywide. Offices responsible for marketing, recruitment, career guidance and Student Support Services were requested to conduct marketing outreach campaigns in communities, specifically focused on (NEET) market, as well as school learners in honouring the National Career Guidance week.

The marketing and recruitment team in collaboration with campus student support officials and community development workers (CDWs) teamed up, and ensured the success of the campaign within the ORBIT TVET College catchment areas. The main target market for this community outreach programme was out-of-school youth and unemployed youth living within the vicinity of Phokeng and Tlaseng villages respectively. Phokeng is the catchment area for Rustenburg Campus, and Tlaseng is the catchment area for Mankwe Campus. The Tlaseng session was represented by four villages within Ward 26, namely: Tsitsing, Tlaseng, Mogajana and Mamerotse. Brits Campus targeted the Madibeng catchment area by hosting at least 25 CDWs. The CDWs were tasked to source a suitable and central community venue to host information-sharing sessions. The National Career Week initiative managed to attract at least 42 out-of-school youth, sixteen CDWs, and approximately 349 learners during the

week of 03 April to 09 April 2022, which is quite an achievement if the tight timeframe is taken into consideration. As the marketing and recruitment team of the College, we will remain committed to our obligation to serve our community by bringing College information and services to the doorstep of our potential publics, even if it requires the team to extend their services beyond the traditional catchment boundaries.

be part of pricing for the service rendered by an enterprise.



However, these activities also come at a high cost. Expenses such as venue hire, advocacy material, transport, attire and refreshments can amount to daunting figures, but this did not deter ORBIT College athletes and officials as the Inter-Campus Track & Fields Championships was hosted on Thursday, 24 February 2022 at the sportsgrounds of the Rustenburg Technical High School.

Following the Inter-Campus Championships, the College was able to register a team consisting of thirty-two (32) male and twenty-two (22) female athletes to participate in the Provincial Track & Fields Championships that was held at the NWU Kenneth McArthur Athletics Stadium in Potchefstroom. The solid performance of our athletes at provincial level secured

fourteen (14) male and eight (8) female athletes an opportunity to participate in the National CoSACSA Track & Fields Championships that was held at the Peter Mokaba Athletics Stadium in Polokwane, Limpopo Province from Thursday, 31 March – Monday, 04 April 2022. This dedicated team of young talented athletes did the North West Province proud as they managed to obtain twelve medals in total at the National Championships.

National Arts and Culture Festival

The National Arts & Culture Festival was hosted from 22 – 24 July 2022 at the International Convention Centre (ICC) in East London, Eastern Cape. ORBIT College was privileged to have ninety-two (92) students participating in an array of categories, which included male and female choirs, free style dance, drama, poetry and fine arts (pencil and charcoal drawing). A group comprising eight students from Mankwe and Rustenburg Campuses, delivered an outstanding performance, choreographed by Rustenburg Campus Report 191 Business Studies Lecturer, Mr Daniel Molefe, securing them a gold medal in the Free Style Dance Category.

Although the overall performance of the College in these national events is commendable, it is necessary to approach the participation of College students in sport, art and cultural activities of this nature, differently. At present the emphasis is on recreational participation, but this approach needs to change to a more competitive approach to improve the preparation of our students for higher level competitions.
